Transcript

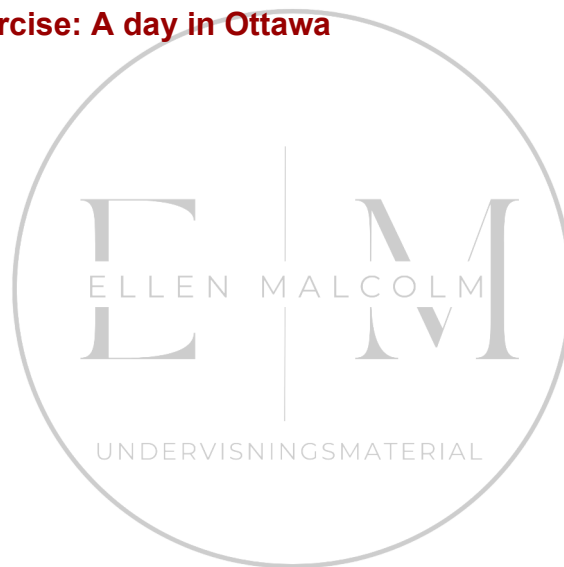


Another important holiday, especially in Quebec, is St. Jean Baptiste Day on June 24th. This day is also called La Fête Nationale and is Quebec's national holiday. This holiday brings the community together to celebrate their language, music, and traditions.
